What made you go into degree?

What is your official title and what are your responsibilities in your current position?

I work for a software development firm, Chariot Solutions, in Fort Washington, PA. I am their Business Development Manager. What is a typical day like at work?

What do you enjoy most about your current position?

Face to face is more relaxed, it's non-confrontational, way more fun (if you are a talker, which I am, and aren't shy of introducing yourself to people, which many times I am not!) Plus trade shows at tech events are pretty awesome!

What skills, talents, and other traits are useful and necessary to do your job?

You definitely need to have high tolerance for rejection. Learning to do research before making any reach out is paramount. And you have to be more of a extrovert than an introvert. I shift both ways on that spectrum, but I do love meeting/talking to new people.

Do you have a favorite or funny story about work?

Well at one of my previous places of employment we were talking about irrational fears. I stated one of mine was being buried alive.
